- Expenses for the year were \$981,570.00 with a deficit of \$78,688.00.



2019-2020 Year End Reflection

As the grade 9 teacher this past year, I have seen growth and an increase in determination from my students over the past 10 months. Students' improvement of work stamina has been the most evident area of growth. While some students show an eagerness to learn, other students have not had ample practice to know how to learn in a way that caters to their interests and skills. The conversations with students have opened my eyes to a traumatic world that I once was not familiar with. My role was not only to improve students' academic standings, but, one in which I was even more honoured by is the role to support and show compassion to students who need it the most. Cornwall Alternative has been the perfect place to start my teaching career, and I will forever be grateful for the rewarding relationships that have come from here.

The past school was a great one. My students did what they could to embrace becoming young adults. They strove to improve themselves physically, emotionally, intellectually, and spiritually. Whether it was cooking for the first time or trying a new activity in Wellness they didn't shy away from difficult tasks. They helped me many times throughout the semester to deliver the grade ten curriculum for the first time. I will miss them, and hope to see them graduate in two more years.

I am so relieved and excited that CAS got three year funding!!!

I am so impressed by the resiliency our students have. I learn so much from them.

My favourite outings this school year was Dallas Valley and our Ski trip to Mission Ridge.

This year at Cornwall has seen many historical changes and not just COVID19. We have had a teacher leave for maternity and other staff leaving. Our wishes for all the best go with them. Cornwall School is a survivor like many of our students. Our program will be only stronger for all the hardships we have endured. I would like to thank Eunice for coming out of retirement and providing stability to our program.

So as for the school year prior to COVID19, the program was running successfully we were seeing positive changed with delivery of homework and keeping touch through computers. This was a learning process for students and teachers. We have developed relationships with many of the parents and caretakers providing instruction and support. Our best efforts to deliver an educational program in a very stressful environment was given. For myself, I will be happy to see the students back in the classroom in fall2020.
